**Inuyama Castle** (Inuyama-jō) is a yamajiro-style Japanese castle located in the city of Inuyama, Aichi Prefecture, Japan. The tenshukaku (main tower) of Inuyama Castle, one of only 12 pre-modern tenshu remaining in existence, has been determined to be the oldest remaining tenshu, dating from the late 1580s. The tenshu of Inuyama Castle is small but shows different silhouettes depend on the angle due to its complex form. It is designated as a National Treasure of Japan in 1935, and the whole castle has been a National Historic Site since 2018.

**Urakuen**, literally means "Uraku's garden", was created to serve as the setting for Jo-an, a priceless seventeenth-century tea house which was built by the tea master Oda Uraku (1547-1621). Jo-an is a masterwork of tea house architecture and one of only three tea houses recognized as National Treasures. The garden also holds Uraku's retirement house and other teahouses where visitors can enjoy traditional style tea service.
